Faith Date Selection

Faith date selection was based on the most common religious affiliations in our community. Based on the 2021 Statistics Canada Census, 67% of Aurorans have a religious affiliation, with the below being the top five religions observed in our community:

50.7% of residents identify as Christian

5.8% of residents identify as Muslim

2.4% identify as Jewish

1.3% identify as Buddhist

1.3% identify as Hindu

- 1 New Year's Day**
The first day of the year of the modern Gregorian calendar. (International)
- 2 Chanukah/Hanukkah**
Chanukah, the Festival of Lights, is an eight-day Jewish holiday in celebrating the success of the Maccabean Revolt against the Seleucid Empire, and the liberating and rededication of Holy Temple in Jerusalem. (Judaism)
- 7 Christmas (Eastern)**
The equivalent of December 25 on the Julian calendar. Many Orthodox Christians celebrate Christmas day on or near this date. (Orthodox Christianity)
- 10 Lunar New Year**
This is the first day after the new moon. A religious and cultural festival for Chinese, Vietnamese and Koreans of Buddhist and other backgrounds. (Buddhism)
- 22 Bell Let's Talk Day**
Helping to raise awareness to address the stigma and challenges around mental health.
- 27 International Holocaust Day of Remembrance**
Designated by the United Nations (UN), this day marks the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau and commemorates the six million Jewish victims of the Holocaust and millions of other victims of Nazism. (International)
- 29 National Day of Remembrance of the Quebec City Mosque Attack and Action against Islamophobia**
A day commemorating the Islamophobic attack that took place at the Grand Mosque in Quebec City, which took the lives of six people and seriously injured 19 others. (Canada)

5 National Girls and Women in Sports Day
honours the achievements of girls and women in sports and continues to Lead Her Forward by acknowledging the power of sports to unlock her limitless potential.

14 Valentine's Day
A day of romance when people celebrate their love for one another. The origin of this holiday dates back to the 5th century and is named after a Christian martyr, St. Valentine. (International)

17 Family Day
A statutory holiday in Ontario.







21 International Mother Tongue Language Day
A worldwide annual observance to promote awareness of linguistic and cultural diversity and to promote multilingualism. (International)

26 Pink Shirt Day
An international awareness day to promote anti-bullying. (International)

28 Ramadan
A holy month in which Muslims fast during daylight hours. It is a period that aims to cleanse the body and soul from impurities and re-focus oneself to the worship of God. (Islam)


 **Persian Heritage Month**
A time to celebrate the achievements and contributions of Ontarians of Persian descent.


- 8 International Women's Day**
A global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural, and political achievements of women. The day is also a call to action for accelerating women's equality.
- 14 Holi**
The Festival of Colours that welcomes spring. Usually celebrated over two days with people throwing colourful powder and coloured water on each other. (Hinduism)
- 20 Nowruz/ Persian New Year**
This marks the first day of spring and is celebrated as the beginning of the new year by more than 300 million people all around the world.
- 21 World Down Syndrome Day**
A day to raise public awareness of Down syndrome and the effective and meaningful inclusion and participation of all people with Down Syndrome.
- 22 World Water Day**
Celebrates water and raises awareness of those living without access to safe water. It is about taking action to tackle the global water crisis.
- 22 Earth Hour**
A global movement where individuals and businesses are encouraged to turn off non-essential electric lights.
- 26 Purple Day**
An international grassroots epilepsy awareness initiative where people are encouraged to wear purple to promote awareness.
- 30 Eid al Fitr**
This is "the breaking of the fast" that celebrates the end of Ramadan. (Observance begins at the sunset of the previous day, but special worship and prayers begin on this day). (Islam)

Commemoration of the resurrection of Jesus from death. (Christianity)

Earth Day aims to raise awareness and demonstrate support of environmental protection, with many events held around the world. (International)

27 National Volunteer Week
National Volunteer Week is a time to celebrate and thank Canada's 24 million + volunteers.

28 National Day of Mourning
held annually in Canada on April 28, is dedicated to remembering those who have lost their lives, suffered injury or illness on the job or a work-related tragedy.

- 1 Emancipation Day**
August 1 is now recognized across Canada as Emancipation Day, marking the end of slavery in the British Empire in 1834. Emancipation Day celebrates the strength and perseverance of Black communities in Canada

- 4 Civic Holiday**
The August Civic Holiday is known by a variety of names across Canada and is celebrated according to local municipal traditions and history.

- 12 International Youth Day**
This is a day to celebrate and mainstream young peoples' voices, actions, and initiatives, as well as their meaningful, universal, and equitable engagement.

- 2 Labour Day**
The first Monday in September, this date has been a statutory holiday in Canada since 1894. It originated in the first workers' rallies of the Victorian era. (Canada)
- 16 World Ozone Day**
This day is observed to spread awareness among people about the depletion of Ozone Layer and search possible solutions to preserve it.
- 22 Rosh HaShanah**
A two-day celebration honouring the creation of the universe. Begins at sundown. (Judaism)
- 25 Rowan's Law Day**
A day to help raise awareness about concussion safety.
- 28 British Home Child Day**
Between 1869 and the late 1940s, during the child emigration movement, over 100,000 British children were sent to Canada from Great Britain. This date recognizes and honour the contributions they have made to Ontario.
- 30 National Day for Truth and Reconciliation**
A day to reflect on the tragic legacy of the residential school system and the ways it continues to affect Indigenous Peoples in Canada.

A time to reflect, celebrate, learn, and appreciate the diversity within Canada's Muslim communities.


Hispanic Heritage Month
Recognizes the rich contributions of Hispanic-Canadians to our social, economic, political and multicultural fabric.

- 1 Yom Kippur**
The Jewish Day of Atonement comprises a 25-hour fast whereby people refrain from working, eating, and drinking. Synagogue services are also attended in worship of this sacred day. Begins at sundown. (Judaism)
- 10 World Mental Health Day**
An annual event to raise awareness of mental health issues around the world and to mobilize efforts in support of mental health.
- 13 Thanksgiving**
A day of giving thanks to the harvest and blessings of the previous year. (Canada)
- 19 Invisible Disabilities Week**
This week brings awareness, education, and support to individuals and communities about unseen disabilities.
- 20 Diwali**
Diwali is a popular festival known as the Festival of Lights. It's celebrated continuously for five days and is associated with a story about the destruction of evil by Lord Vishnu in one of his many manifestations. (Hinduism)
- 31 Halloween**
Halloween is thought to have originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, though it shares important ties with various other celebrations from several faiths and cultures, including Día de los Muertos (or the Day of the Dead), All Saints Day, and All Souls Day.

3 International Day of Persons with Disabilities

Promoted by the UN, this day is to promote an understanding of disability issues and mobilize support for the dignity, rights, and well-being of persons with disabilities. (International)

6 National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women

This is a day to remember those who have been victims of gender-based violence and those we have lost. It is also a time to take action to prevent and respond to gender-based violence by remembering and learning from our past, listening to survivors and speaking out against harmful behavior. (Canada)

14 Chanukah

Chanukah, the Festival of Lights, is an eight-day Jewish holiday in celebrating the success of the Maccabean Revolt against the Seleucid Empire, and the liberating and rededication of Holy Temple in Jerusalem. Begins at previous sundown and ends December 22. (Judaism)

24 Christmas Eve

This is the evening before Christmas and is often observed with a long meal and or mass, usually with family. (Christianity)

25 Christmas (Western)

A holiday celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ. It is recognized as a public holiday in many nations around the world and is also celebrated secularly by many non-Christians. (Christianity)

26 Kwanza

A week-long celebration of African-Canadian culture.

26 Boxing Day

The day after Christmas Day was traditionally celebrated as the day tradesmen and servants would receive gifts from their employers. (International)
