# WHAT TO DO WHEN APPROACHING A TRAFFIC CIRCLE

#### **VEHICLES**


- Slow Down! Traffic Circles are designed for speeds of 15-30 km/hr.
- 2. Watch for Pedestrians! Pedestrians cross at the crosswalk before the Traffic Circle.
- When approaching the Traffic Circle, be prepared to stop and yield the right-of-way to traffic already in the circle.
- When entering a Traffic Circle, drivers wishing to turn left must travel around the centre island in a counter-clockwise direction and are not to cut in front of the island in a clock-wise direction.
- 5. When exiting a Traffic Circle, watch for pedestrians crossing the crosswalk.

#### **PEDESTRIANS**

- When approaching a designated crosswalk area, pedestrians must watch for approaching traffic and yield the right-of-way. Remember, motorists do not need to stop to allow you to cross the road.
- When opposing traffic is clear, pedestrians can then cross. If a vehicle is approaching in the opposite direction, pedestrians can walk to the splitter island and wait for the traffic to clear.
- 3. Once traffic is clear, pedestrians can then proceed to the other side.

#### **CYCLISTS**

- When approaching a Traffic Circle, cyclists must watch for pedestrians and yield to vehicles already in the circular roadway.
- Once the traffic is clear, cyclists may proceed in a counter-clockwise direction and exit the Traffic Circle watching for pedestrians.



# Things NOT to do at a Traffic Circle

- When making a left turn, do NOT cut in front of the centre island. Drive around the island in a counter-clockwise direction.
- Pedestrians are to cross at the designated crosswalks and NOT through the centre island.
- Do NOT speed through a Traffic Circle as they are designed for low speeds.

### **DEFINITIONS**

**Approach:** the portion of a roadway leading into a Traffic Circle.

**Centre Island:** the raised area in the centre of a Traffic Circle around which traffic circulates.

**Circular Roadway:** the portion of the Traffic Circle where vehicles and cyclists travel in a counter clock-wise direction to make their exit.

**Pedestrian Crosswalk:** a marked pedestrian crossing at an intersection.

**Splitter Island:** a raised or painted area on an approach used to separate entering and exiting traffic, deflect and slow entering traffic, and provide a refuge for pedestrians crossing the intersection in two stages.

**Yield Line:** a pavement marking used to mark the point of entry from an approach into the circular roadway and the point where a vehicle must stop to yield for traffic already in the circular roadway.
